Chapter Presidents have been sending me their Annual Reports with details on how their Chapter has been doing over the past year. One of the persistent dilemmas is planning for meaningful meetings that are well attended. In my e-mail conversation to **Nancy Pankow**, *Theta*, who is looking ahead to next year, some ideas came to mind. Current members, even though retired in some cases, have had interesting careers - Could they do educational programs in their field at a chapter meeting? Could a chapter meeting highlight new technology - smart phones, cameras, e-readers - with some local tech savvy students doing a demo presentation? How about your Historical Records and Scrapbook Committee doing a memory lane presentation and have long time members contribute their input, too? Do you ever have a meeting where committees meet and discuss their roles and goals and share these with the whole membership? Some chapters have colleges in the area which might have people who would come and speak on an educational or cultural topic that would interest working teachers.

New members add to the pool of ideas. As busy professionals, they value meetings that include their interests. If your chapter is to remain vital, it is necessary to take in at least one or two new members each year. Now is a good time to be working on this.

I challenge each current member to think about what contributions they have made in the past and to plan how to connect to the future of our Society at every level but especially to the chapter. Perhaps you will be inspired by attending the **Northeast Regional in Hershey, PA, July 20-23**. It is an awesome experience to attend professional workshops, hear about the workings of the Society, meet members from Maine to Illinois and see a unique area of our country. *Consider yourself invited*!

Membership & Expansion

Each state organization in The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International has a Membership Committee. *What are the Committee's jobs?* One of the main goals of membership committees in Pi State, as is true in International, is to help each chapter in the state as much as possible with any and all membership issues.

One issue all chapters are concerned about is growing their membership and keeping their members of all experience levels engaged in the work of their chapter and of the Society. Some chapters don't need much help in this area. We have ideas and "*We are connected*," as our President, **Joan Slagle** reminds us!

Another important purpose of the Membership Committee is to keep a record of how many members are added to the various chapters and to record members who pass away. It is the privilege of the Membership Committee to honor the memory of our deceased sisters for the devotion each one gave to the career we all love and for her commitment and contributions to her chapter and Delta Kappa Gamma.

This spring, *The Hour of Remembrance*, will be held at the Pi State Convention in Syracuse on Sunday morning, May 1st at 8:00am. All are welcome to attend and honor our DKG sisters who passed away in 2010.

Fellow Committee members, whom I highly respect for their enthusiasm, willingness to try new ideas and energy, are Karla Bates, Alpha Psi, Julia Hoover, Delta, Arlene Ida, Alpha Kappa, Mary Kula, Beta Epsilon, and Ann Walker, Alpha Delta. When appointed, we reviewed the Committee responsibilities and duties, as set forth in the Guidelines for Committee Chair, and selected our goals:

- * Respond to the needs/charge of the State organization
- * Implement programs designed to encourage mutual respect, understanding,
- and cooperation among chapters at the International level, and
- * Investigate professional development requirements of our members.

We made personal contact with DKG sisters from chapters in Britain. E-mails have been exchanged, but more follow-up is needed. Audit

The **Pi State Audit Committee** meets twice a year to verify the Treasurer's Accounts. This is done to protect the Society's money and to monitor the State Treasurer's accounting. By auditing accounts on a regular basis, it gives the State Treasurer the support she needs in deciding where money coming into the State should go and from which account money should be taken. The Audit Committee points out errors and they are corrected. We have made suggestions to her when she first took on the job. Our suggestions have helped her organize accounting and understand the position and purposes of the varying accounts. We continue to suggest things to her, always trying to make the process clearer, more precise and accountable.

This process should be done once a year within each chapter. The State has guidelines for auditing the State accounts that could be adapted for your chapter. If you would like a copy of these guidelines or have any questions about your chapter funds, please contact me by e-mail at jeanbsekel@yahoo.com, phone 315.823.1519 or mail 128 Inghams Mills Road, Little Falls, NY 13365.

Please note that if you are asked to chair an Area Conference, State Executive Board Meeting, State Conference or Leadership Seminar, you will need to turn in a financial report after the meeting. Forms are available from the Audit Chair and will be sent to you upon appointment.

The most important accounting standard for all chapters is to retain receipts for any money received and bills for any money to be paid out. They MUST be attached to the financial report.

Unfortunately, we have had some chapters dissolve recently. When this happens, the money left in the chapter accounts must be accounted for by following the *State Standing Rules and BYLAWS* and your *Chapter Standing Rules*. A financial report must be turned in to the Audit Committee.

I have had the pleasure of working with wonderfully dedicated women who scrutinize every penny that comes in or goes out of the State Accounts: Celia Bradford, *Pi*, Mary Franklin, *Gamma Zeta*, Judith Kiehle, *Omega*, and Jane Tanner, *Beta Kappa*. Please let them know that you appreciate their time and dedication.

Pi State Treasurer Suzanne Patrick, *Rho*, has been wonderful in providing the materials we need to do our audit and being present to answer our questions and receive our advice.

Leadership Development Committee

The responsibility of the **Leadership Development Committee** is stated in the State BYLAWS: "The committee shall plan and implement programs for State and Chapter officers and Committee Chairs."

The Committee has three primary activities:

- 1. In the first year of a new President's biennium, a Seminar is conducted for the incoming State Committee Chairs.
- 2. In the second year of the biennium, a Seminar is presented for incoming Chapter Presidents.
- 3. Additionally, the State President may request that a specific program be designed and presented to the State Executive Committee.

Attendance at these Seminars is strongly encouraged for each biennium Chapter officers and Committee Chairs. *The participants will:*

*Grow in knowledge

- *Have a clearer vision of their individual duties
- *Understand how they relate to others in the state/international organizations
- *Be prepared to perform their responsibilities effectively and efficiently and

*Enjoy the comradery of other Pi State members The Leadership Development Committee is anticipating an enjoyable learning experience for the incoming 2011 Pi State Committee Chairs. *They will be hearing from us in the spring*.

Included in these modifications was the reorganization of Standing Committees. No longer is there a designated Program Committee at the International level.

Program of Work now falls under Society Mission and Purposes: Educational Excellence. The **Educational Excellence Committee** "shall promote programs and projects for excellence in education. The Committee shall identify long-term and short-term programs and projects that focus upon topics adopted by the society. The Committee shall support programs of action that promote the personal well-being, intellectual growth, and global awareness of women educators; encourage a focus on the arts at International Conventions, Regional Conferences and State Organization Conventions; and develop strategies that will enable chapters to encourage members to become leaders."

The DKG International Educational Excellence

Committee adopted a self-definition, which will be equally appropriate for state organizations and chapter committees: "*The Educational Excellence Committee promotes International projects, supports early-career educators, and encourages programs and activities that further educational excellence worldwide.*" For the Society to have the greatest impact on education, chapters and state organizations need to focus on no more than two Society-wide initiatives:

- Support for the Society's official Schools for Africa project and
- Support for early-career educators.

In addition, chapters and state organizations will benefit from resources for programs and activities that encourage educational excellence by addressing the professional and personal growth of women educators and the diverse interests of members.

Ann-Marie Carlson

12th Annual CTAUN Conference January 14, 2011 – United Nations Conference Room One "ACHIEVING THE MILLENNIUM DEVELOPMENT GOALS: Teaching for Action"

Anne-Marie Carlson, Phi, Chair of the Committee on Teaching about the United Nations (CTAUN), opened the conference by welcoming the 403 registrants from the US, Canada and Sweden, including a group of 48 from The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International, 23 from American Association of University Women and 15 Fulbright scholars from 14 countries.

The CTAUN Conference addressed key questions: Can we achieve the Millennium Development Goals? How do we teach our students about them? How can a community take action?

The morning Keynote Speaker was Nicholas Kristof, Pulitzer Prize winning columnist for The New York Times. "Why should I Care?" He spoke about the oppression of women in developing countries, offering many examples of such treatment that he saw in his own travels. He also believes that women are the economic and social solution to the problems of poverty and hunger. Engagement in a cause greater than oneself is what brings happiness and new perspectives to those who give. When you put a face to suffering, it becomes real. He ended by encouraging us to get out into the developing world and see for ourselves.

Dr. Gonzalo Pizarro, Policy Specialist, UN Development Programme, gave a brief history and explanation of the eight Millennium Development Goals (MDG), challenging the audience to adopt one of the goals and volunteer, donate, and pressure legislators to make changes.

Ramu Damodaran, Deputy Director, Outreach Division, UN Department of Public Information, described the Academic Impact Initiative, calling it a true partnership between the university, faculty and students, the United Nations and the MDGs.

Three panel discussions on *Health* (MDG 4, 5, 6), *Education* (MDG 2, 3) and *Poverty*, *Hunger and Environment* (MDG 1, 7, 8) were presented during the morning and afternoon sessions. Experts from organizations that work in countries most at risk described what they do to help achieve the Goals.


The Closing Keynote Speaker was Helen Clark, Administrator UNPP and former Prime Minister of New Zealand. She tied together all the strands of thought presented throughout the day, issuing a challenge to us and the world to achieve the Goals by 2015 and then reach beyond them for a better future. "Basic social safety nets are a moral obligation," she said. "If my neighbor is poor, I am too."

The afternoon ended with a beautiful performance by the United Nations Singers.

An Information Fair and Exhibition was included in the Conference.
