The support I received from my fellow Executive Committee members was key to a successful biennium. My Biennium as State Secretary assisted in building a foundation of Society knowledge that has served both my Chapter and Area-Council. It was through my involvement in the leadership of Pi State that I have come to understand and appreciate that I am indeed a member of an International Society. Please consider embracing this exciting leadership opportunity. Below you will find the job description for State Secretary.

Pi State Secretary

Liaison for Committees Subject to Endowment Provisions

The Secretary shall serve as one of the elected officers of Pi State. She will work with the State President and the other members of the State Executive Committee in the performance of her duties.

I. Qualifications

- A. The Secretary shall have been a Pi State member in good standing for a minimum of five years.
- B. She shall have a broad knowledge of the organization and the operation of the Society.
- C. She shall have exhibited qualities of leadership and administrative ability at the Chapter level.

II. Term of Office

- A. The term of office shall be for two years.
- B. She may serve in this office for no longer than two terms in succession.
- C. She shall take office on July 1 following the election.

III. Responsibilities/Duties

- A. Attend and participate in the State Executive Committee Meetings, State Executive Board Meetings and State Convention
- B. Attend, if possible, the Regional Conference and International Convention
- C. Take minutes at Executive Committee, Executive Board, and Convention and Corporation meetings and distribute to Board within 60 days
- D. Act as Liaison to Committees Subject to Endowment Provisions
- E. Fulfill Leadership Training assignments
- F. Act as an official representative and speaker at Chapter and Area Council Meetings/Conferences
- G. Participate in planning for State Executive Board Meetings and Convention as directed by the President
- H. Fulfill other requests of the President and/or Executive Board

I. Acquaint Incoming Secretary with procedural and substantive responsibilities of the position

The Nominations Committee was also seeking applications for the following elected positions on these important Pi State Committee. Your election will ensure that your Area Council is represented in the work of Pi State over the next Biennium.

Finance Committee:

The Finance Committee consists of an elected member from each Area for a four-year term. The Pi State President, Treasurer and Executive Secretary serve as *Ex-officio* members without vote. The Committee is responsible for the supervision of the financial affairs of Pi State, including recommendations for the expenditure and investment of funds and preparation of a budget for adoption by the Executive Board.

Capital Area, South Central and North Central

Nominations Committee:

The Pi State Nominations Committee screens and reviews all candidate nominations/applications, including credentials and letters of support, and recommends a slate of Pi State Officers to the Pi State Executive Board for action at the Pi State Convention. The Committee is also responsible to recommend nominees for Area Council representatives to the Pi State Nominations Committee.

East Central, Southwest and West Central

It is time for leadership conversations to begin. Are your ready to increase your involvement in Pi State? Do you know of a fellow Chapter Member who shows untapped leadership potential? Is there a deserving candidate in your Area Council? Your encouragement will foster both personal development and strengthen our Society. Interested candidates need to be nominated from the floor during our Executive Board Meeting at the Otesaga in Cooperstown.

The full document of the proposed BYLAWS & STANDING RULES CHANGES FOR 4.29.17 may be found on the Pi State Website, including the following additions, and on pp. 9 - 15 of this issue.

Please Note: Add the following to the document in the Winter 2017 Issue of *Pi Lights*:

To BYLAWS: To amend Article XII section A:

Rationale: Publishing the amended BYLAWS in the winter issue of Pi Lights allows for adequate time for voting at the State Convention.

To STANDING RULES: To amend Section 5 Officers and Related Personnel by adding numbers 5.10 - 5.105 5.10 Website Editor

- 5.101 She shall be responsible for the editing of documents for the Delta Kappa Gamma Pi State Website and sending them to the Webmaster.
- 5.102 She shall archive all documents and make revisions as appropriate.
- 5.103 She shall communicate with Chapter Webmasters and ensure Compliance is maintained.
- 5.104 She shall receive an annual honorarium as recommended by the Finance Committee and approved by the Executive Board.
- 5.105 She shall abide by the terms of agreement for her position and perform such duties as prescribed in her job description.

The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International Pi State PROPOSED BYLAWS and STANDING RULES CHANGES FOR 4/29/17

PROPOSED BYLAW CHANGES FOR 4/29/17

In accordance with ARTICLE XII Section A of the **BYLAWS of Pi (New York) State of The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International,** the Bylaws and Rules Committee and the Pi State Executive Committee propose the following amendments to the **BYLAWS of Pi (New York) State of The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International** to be voted upon by the Pi State Executive Board and the Pi State Convention at their meetings April 29, 2017 in Cooperstown, New York.

In addition to the following proposed changes, the BYLAWS & Rules Committee in consultation with the Pi State Parliamentarian reserves the right to make numbering and wording changes and to update the Table of Contents as is deemed necessary for clarity and ease-of-use.

1. To amend Article IV Section A 1 which reads:

The Pi State annual dues shall be determined by the State Executive Board in consultation with the State Finance Committee and approved by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the members present in a State Convention or at a Spring Executive Board Meeting (non-Convention year) provided written notification is presented to the membership no later than the **spring issue** of *Pi Lights*.

By deleting spring and replacing with winter

To Read:

The Pi State annual dues shall be determined by the State Executive Board in consultation with the State Finance Committee and approved by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the members present in a State Convention or at a Spring Executive Board Meeting (non-Convention year) provided written notification is presented to the membership no later than the **winter issue** of *Pi Lights*.

Rationale: Voting on dues would occur in April at a Convention or Executive Board/Spring Seminar Meeting and the change allows for proper time.

2. To amend Article VI section B 3 which reads:

An Editor, a Financial Development Fund (FDF) Administrator and a Webmaster shall be selected by the Executive Board from the recommendation of the Personnel Committee.

To Add:

An Editor, a Financial Development Fund (FDF) Administrator, Webmaster and a **Website Editor** shall be selected by the Executive Board from the recommendation of the Personnel Committee.

Rational: To include the position of the Website Editor so corrections are made on website.

3. To amend Article VI section C 5 which reads

The Executive Secretary, Treasurer, Editor, FDF Administrator, Webmaster and other related personnel appointed by the Executive Board shall perform such duties as are prescribed in each job description.

To Add:

The Executive Secretary, Treasurer, Editor, FDF Administrator, Webmaster, **Website Editor** and other related personnel appointed by the Executive Board shall perform such duties as are prescribed in each job description. *Rationale: To add Website Editor so that her duties may be included.*

4. To amend Article VI section D4 which read

The terms of office of the Executive Secretary, Treasurer, Editor, FDF Administrator, Webmaster and other related personnel appointed by the Executive Board shall be as stated in each job description.

To Add:

The terms of office of the Executive Secretary, Treasurer, Editor, FDF Administrator, Webmaster, **Website Editor** and other related personnel appointed by the Executive Board shall be as stated in each job description. *Rationale: Addition of Website Editor to explain the rules of her selection and the term of her office.*

5. To amend Article IX section C 3 I which reads:

The Personnel Committee shall screen and recommend candidates to the Executive Board at the end of a term for Executive Secretary, Treasurer, Editor, Financial Development Fund Administrator and Webmaster.

To Add

THE PI STATE EDUCATIONAL FOUNDATION

The *Pi State Educational Foundation* is a tax-exempt organization that promotes literacy and learning by supporting literacy projects developed by Pi State members and Chapters. These projects are supported solely by your donations and membership fees.

We had a **very** active grant-application year in 2016. The Foundation awarded 9 grants to Chapters and individuals in Pi State for a total of \$7707.08! This considerably reduced our treasury and our ability to award grants in the future. If we are to continue the Foundation's great work of supporting literacy projects in the State, we first need all of you to encourage more of your Chapter members to join the Foundation and consider making regular donations to the Foundation Treasury so it maintains a healthy balance to award grants! At the 2016 Annual Meeting, Past Pi State President **Cathie Olinger**, *Beta Psi*, 1993-1995 recommended that Chapters consider donating to the Foundation to honor Chapter members who are retiring from active teaching. She said that her Chapter gave retirees a gift but now make an Honorary Donation instead. Membership and donation forms are always available on the Pi State Website in the Educational Foundation section.

I am pleased to report that grants have been awarded to members in twenty-one of our Chapters in Pi State since the Foundation began. Seven of those Chapters have received grants multiple times. Since the first grant was awarded in January 2005, Pi State members have made it possible to support literacy projects worth \$21,777.08. As I have said before, I believe that this work is one of the BEST things that we do for ourselves and the children and people of Pi State.

Reaching out to Dropped Members:

Maintaining Relationship and Encouraging Reinstatement

"Make new friends, but keep the old. One is silver, the other is gold.

A circle is round, it has no end. That's how long I will be your friend."

If you were ever involved in Girl Scouts, you may remember this catchy campfire tune. First published in the *Girl Scouts Handbook* in 1924, it was most likely inspired by Welsh poet Joseph Parry (1841-1903). In his poem, *New Friends and Old Friends*, he reminds readers to "*cherish friendship in your breast/new is good, but old is best.*" As people have come and gone in my life, I have to confess that I have often been a better new friend than an old friend. My husband still communicates once a week via conference call with his band of backyard buddies from grade school, but I have tended to lose touch with friends from high school, college and previous jobs. This jingle reminds me of the value of long-time relationships and occasionally inspires me to reach out with a phone call, greeting card or email. Some of those lapsed friendships were forged in my DKG Chapter. With the renewed commitment in our Society to reinstate dropped members, I find myself humming the tune again.

According to the DKG International's 2015 Dropped Member Survey Results, 66% of survey respondents indicated that they were satisfied or extremely satisfied with their experiences as a DKG member. Some of the reasons for dropping membership included family/personal concerns (42%), professional responsibilities (11%), Chapter not meeting needs (11%), and financial concerns (7%). 65% of the respondents indicated that they would likely respond favorably if they were invited to reinstate their membership. This is great news! Now is the time to reach out to our dropped members with the invitation of reinstatement.

Consider creating a "Friends of the Chapter" email/mailing list for dropped members. Include them when you send out information about programs and activities. Reach out to let them know that you still value them and want to maintain relationship with them. Perhaps Chapter members could follow up with a phone call or personal note to invite those individuals to a program or outing. Treat them as though they are new prospective members. Let them come back to check out all the wonderful things your Chapter, Area Council and DKG International are doing now. If someone doesn't want to keep this line of communication open, it is easy enough to take her name off the list. The circumstances that influenced members to leave DKG may have changed; let's reach out to let them know that they are welcome to come back at any time.

A dropped member may be reinstated simply by writing a letter to the Chapter President indicating that she would like to rejoin the Chapter. No vote is required. Simply download Form 83, *Reinstated Member Form*, from the DKG International website, <u>www.dkg.org</u>. This form explains that members reinstated before April 1st will pay membership dues and scholarship fee at the time of reinstatement. Members reinstated after April 1st and before July 1st shall pay dues and fee for the ensuing year no later than October 30th.

Let's take a page from that Girl Scout songbook and tell our dropped members how much we value and miss them.

2017 CTAUN Conference at the UN

"Refugees: The 21st Century Challenge"

Friday, January 27, 2017

On Friday January 27, 2017, the Committee on Teaching about the United Nations (CTAUN) hosted its 18th Annual Conference, "Refugees: The 21st Century Challenge."

Anne-Marie Carlson, *Phi*, Chair of the *Committee on Teaching about the United Nations* (CTAUN), welcomed and chaired the Conference. There were 704 registrants, including university, colleges and high school students and educators.

A large number of children are refugees. In fact, 28 million children have been displaced by conflict and violence. A new report on this subject, "Uprooted: The Growing Crisis for Refugee and Migrant Children," was recently released from UNICEF. Emily Garin, the report's author, was one of the Morning Issues panelists.

In the Opening Session, **Ninette Kelly**, Director of NY Office of the UN High Commissioner for Refugees, reported that 65,000,000 people in the world have been forcibly ejected from their homes and that there has been a 50% increase in 2010-2016 with over half children. She stated: "*The role of teachers is vital.*"

CTAUN Vice Chair **Grace Murphy**, *Alpha Beta*, introduced the Afternoon Panel, "Assistance and Resources."

At the end of the Conference, an Outcome Statement, produced by Cora Weiss of The

Hague Appeal for Peace and CTAUN Chair Anne-Marie Carlson, was adopted by acclamation:

"As refugees continue to risk their lives to escape persecution, violence and war, there is a shared responsibility within the international community to protect their lives and address the causes of this major 21^{st} century challenge. Figures compiled by the United Nations High Commissioner of Refugees reveal that more than 21 million fellow human beings around the world have become refugees. Over half of these individuals are under the age of 18. In recognition of the New York Declaration adopted at the UN Summit for Refugees and Migrants on 19 September 2016, this "Refugees: The 21^{st} Century Challenge" Conference calls upon the entire international community – governments, non-governmental organizations and civil society in general – to help:

- protect the rights of all refugees, including the rights of women and girls, and promote their participation in finding solutions
- ensure that all children receive education within a few months of arrival
- respond to and help prevent sexual and gender-based violence
- support those countries which are rescuing, receiving and hosting large numbers of refugees and migrants
- work toward ending the practice of detaining children for the purpose of determining their refugee status
- and to ensure that refugees are not returned to situations where their lives and freedom are at risk.

Special efforts must also be made to stop the causes of refugee flow. Preventing war, terrorism, persecution and other causes should include aid for economic development, education and a commitment to human rights

Pi State U.S. Forum Update Spring, 2017

This year celebrates the Centennial of Women's Suffrage in New York State. More than ever we are reminded of exercising our rights and continuing to be active participants in government. With women making up over 50% of the population, our representation in local, state, and national government is only 19%.

More than ever our legislators need to know your position on equal pay, women's health, paid child leave and educational issues. Calls, texts, and post cards are ways to communicate to your legislators.

NY State

At the state level, you can keep updated on Legislative Sessions, Bills, Summaries, and Floor Votes at http://public.leginfo.state.ny.us.

Current issues to follow:

Early in Person Voting and No Excuse Absentee Voting: Thirty-seven other states and the District of Columba have some form of early voting. NY only allows voters to cast their ballots on one Election Day or vote by absentee ballot. There is discussion on changing election law in legislation.

Juvenile Justice: There is legislation looking at protection of Children's legal rights. It is felt that juvenile justice should focus on rehabilitation programs rather than punitive action. The proposal calls for children under the age of 18 to not be treated as adults in the criminal justice system.

The Gender Expression Non-Discrimination Act (GENDA): Protection for transgender New Yorkers from discrimination in housing, employment, access to credit, medical care and public accommodations along with additional protections under the NY Hate Crimes Law.

Federal

Federal changes involve Immigration, Tax Reform, Affordable Health Care. It's important to be aware of what is happening and voice your concerns. Contact Senator Kirsten Gillibrand at www.gillibrand.senate.gov and Senator Chuck Schumer at www.schumer.senate.gov. Assembly representatives can be found at http://m.house.gov/legislature.

To quote Senator Gillibrand, "We need you out there, get off the sidelines and start making your voice heard on issues you care about."

Gabriel Bol Deng, one of the "Lost Boys of the Sudan," was the featured speaker at the South Central Area Council Conference, held at the Garden Hilton Inn in the Corning/Elmira area, October 1st. His plight has touched many educators in Central NY where he arrived as a child refugee, eventually earning a college degree in math education. He has been a frequent visitor to local schools, including Corning Community College. Mr. Deng believes that one of our most valuable assets is education. He has dedicated much of his life to supporting students of all ages, especially girls.

Educating Girls in Ariang, South Sudan

This effort was inspired by CTAUN 2016 and made possible by a Pi State 2016 Educational Foundation Grant with all proceeds going to the *Hope for Ariang Foundation*. Funding such an international project was challenging since tracking expenditures in war-torn areas is difficult. Fortunately, School in Ariang has escaped direct attacks during their country's instability and thrives with 650 eager students (250 girls). Sudanese girls bear responsibility of fetching water for the family, often taking several hours each day. *Hope for Ariang* funded the drilling of 9 wells in the community, freeing girls to pursue education. The grant and South Central Conference proceeds helped fund teacher training for the school. *Beta Chi* members continue to donate school supplies.

A passionate Mr. Deng hopes that the project will build a secure foundation for the democracy he witnessed here in the United States.



DKG INTERNATIONAL Neutrality Statement

A strength of DKG women is their knowledge and involvement in the world of education and events that impact educators and learners. DKG members ask questions before they take action. They take action, use their voices, and know they make a difference. They are reasonable and open-minded, and they live in the world with passionate care.

Controversies surrounding the transition of power in the United States have motivated DKG members to ask how the Society itself can "take a stand." In response to these inquiries, we offer the following statement of nonprofit neutrality.

Statement of Neutrality

As individuals, DKG members cherish the personal right of free speech. As leading women educators, DKG members want to--and should--take a stand on important issues. Purpose 4 of the Society, in fact, encourages members "To initiate, endorse and support desirable legislation or other suitable endeavors in the interests of education and of women educators."

In contrast to speaking as an individual, however, "speaking" on behalf of an international, nonprofit organization is a complex endeavor. First, in the United States, the IRS restricts political and advocacy involvement of nonprofits; penalties can include revocation of nonprofit status. Second, the DKG Constitution, echoing Purpose 4, dictates in Article VIII, Section C., f. "that the committee (Educational Excellence Committee) shall study and recommend action on professional issues and shall urge the state organizations to initiate, endorse and support desirable legislation or other suitable endeavors in the interest of education and women educators." The International Standing Rules further state in 8.102, c. "Legislative action shall be based on a thorough understanding of the issues involved in supporting excellence in education, equality for women, and a safe, peaceful educational environment." The Rule continues in d: "Legislative activity shall be concerned with educational issues, not with candidates or political parties."

Of course, the difference between issue advocacy and political intervention can be very difficult, which leads to the third point of complexity regarding "speaking" on behalf of The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International. Although united in a genuine spiritual fellowship, we are an organization of diversity--of various positions, experiences, opinions, passions, values and beliefs. The Society ultimately can only "speak" through formal consensus of members on **legislative** matters; without such formal consensus, **neutrality must be the position for this nonprofit organization**.

Thus, when issues or controversies arise, each member must follow her personal journey to act on her passions and beliefs, whether by contacting a legislator, writing an op-ed piece for a local paper, using social media under her own name, or organizing or participating in a march or demonstration. We support our love of DKG best, as well as represent our personal values, by acting with grace and supporting our organization as one that includes women with many different viewpoints-sometimes represented in the same chapter.

Proposed Amendments to International Constitution & Standing Rules

As a Convention Attendee in 2020, you may be able to cast YOUR vote for International Officers.

As a result of a motion at the Nashville International Convention, President **Carolyn Pittman** appointed an Ad Hoc Committee to review the work of the 2012-2014 Ad Hoc Election Process Committee and propose amendments to the *Constitution* and *International Standing Rules* to enable Convention attendees to vote for Officers.

In order for attendees to vote for the Officers in 2020, the governing documents must be amended at the upcoming 2018 Convention in Austin, Texas.
