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Dear NYSO DKG members:

As you all know, we are faced with an unprecedented health crisis. States, communities, and organizations across the nation are forced to take steps to safeguard our citizenry. We, as an organization, must consider what is best for our members, and so we are announcing some changes in the calendar.

The Executive Committee has been conversing frequently about plans for upcoming events. In particular, our Spring Executive Board/Seminar Meeting scheduled for April 24 - 25, 2020 has been a major topic of discussion. We have not rushed into a decision because the meeting is at the end of April, rather than the March to mid-April dates that seemed to be the focus of so many changes. Not only did we have concerns about our members' health, but we also have a fiscal responsibility to our organization to consider.

With all of this in mind, and in consultation with the Executive Committee and Past Presidents, I have decided to cancel our April 24 - 25 meeting in Syracuse. There are some items of business that must be addressed. Here is the plan.

- 1. The Executive Board must vote on the proposed budget. Our governing documents allow for this vote to be electronic. Once the details are ironed out, members of the Executive Board will receive a ballot by email to return to both Lisa Huyck (NYSO DKG Secretary) and me. Look for details in forthcoming emails.
- 2. The Standing Rules changes which have been proposed are more a matter of cleaning up language and can easily wait until our Fall meeting (October 16 17 at the Delta Hotel in Utica).
- 3. Appointment of personnel: Executive Secretary, Webmaster, and FDF Sales. According to our acting Parliamentarian, the current Executive Secretary and FDF Sales can continue in these roles until the Fall meeting. The President can temporarily appoint an Interim Webmaster as of July 1, 2020 until we can vote in October.
- 4. Our NYSO DKG State Chairs will each write a Board Report that will be placed on our State webpage.
- 5. Those receiving awards will be notified and receive any monetary amounts at the designated times. Our Saturday luncheon at the Fall meeting will become our Awards Luncheon, where we can honor the awardees, our 25- and 50-year members, and celebrate Chapter Birthdays and Anniversaries.
- 6. The April 25 Leadership Training session for new presidents will not take place. The Leadership Development Committee will have to consider if they intend to do anything to replace this session. The three "On The Road" sessions will still take place in July. The Committee will also begin work on the possibility of writing webinars on the individual topics covered in the training.
- **7.** If you have booked a room at the Sheraton Syracuse University Hotel and Conference Center for the April 24 & 25 meeting, you will have to call and cancel the reservation. They will not do it automatically.

As a society everyone, regardless of age, feels a part of an entity that is making contributions to education. I look forward to seeing many members from New York, and around the world, in Philadelphia!

- 8. This cancellation limits the number of workshops that the EEC can offer during the biennium. The EEC will have to consider the possible offerings and decide just which ones will ultimately be offered in the fall and next spring. There is a May 1, 2020 deadline for workshop proposals for this fall.
- 9. The Benefit Drawing for the Area Council Baskets will continue to run and will be held at the Fall meeting in Utica. Continue to sell those benefit tickets.

The Sheraton has been extremely cooperative and has agreed to postpone our meeting reservation to April, 2022 without penalty. Our finances are not impacted by the cancellation. The Hotel was under no obligation to do this and we are extremely grateful for their generosity.




Elected State Personnel Nominations

Be sure you have shered your profil under the My Participation tab of your MyDKGeprofil . This will allow others to see you in the membersonly directory. You can find members to connect with about common interests or positions.

Keep your email updated in MyDKG to allow Headquarters to connect with you when they send out important information.

Your SO Can Help Too

Chapter membersdnay fin help from their state organization (SO) as well as from Headquarters or Communities. Your SO's website will have the name and email address of the SO officers. If you cannot find it there, use the chat feature on the International website to ask! They will have that information and be glad to help!

Get Connected with Headquarters

Chapter members are the heart of our Society; Society Headquarters is the central nervous system! It directs and integrates functios of the body, collects and interprets decisions of the body, and keeps the body moving. Thus, keeping the heart connected to the central core is important, and Headquarters staff is there to make that happen.

When the heart is feeling disconnected and needs support of Society

Headquarters, knowing who to contact helps ease the anxiety. Nita Scott, Executive Director, said, "The membership team is usually one of the first to interact with members about concerns." Connect with Society Headquarters staff through email, phone calls, or the chat feature. The Contact Us tab on the DKG website provides a starting point with the email addresses and specific extension numbers for all Headquarters' staff.

Don't feel isolated or wonder who to contact! If you have questions or concerns, determine your area of need and connect with a staff member.

First Line to Connect—the Chat Feature

The chat feature is the quickest way to get connected with Headquarters. A membership specialist monitors it constantly during business hours—7:30 a.m. to 6:20 p.m. Central time. Questios left when the chat is offline are answered the next business morning. (If you know your member number, include it please.



It'll help speed your reply if it relates to membership.) Every attempt is made to answer questions when you start the chat but some require research and the specialist will get back to you as quickly as possible. All types of questions are answered, so if you do not know who to contact, start with the chat feature.

THE PI STATE EDUCATIONAL FOUNDATION

The Pi State Educational Foundation is a tax-exempt organization that promotes literacy and learning by supporting literacy projects developed by Pi State members and chapters.

In our last issue, we reported that three grants had been approved for funding in the November 2019 round. However, the grants themselves were inadvertently omitted. We apologize to the winners! Their information follows:

- --Corrine DeRue of Alpha Tau Chapter was awarded \$1,200.00 for her grant "Uke Can Do It!" She will purchase a classroom set of ukuleles for use in her Grades 3-5 school. The students will learn how to care for the instruments, to read chord tablature and how to play simple chords leading to songs.
- --Deborah Hoffman of Beta Delta Chapter was awarded \$778.40 for her grant "Waterloo's Stories from Oral Histories." Consultation services are being paid for to learn how to best collect, choose and store oral histories from seniors in the Waterloo area that have been heard from past family members and friends. Once recorded, the stories will be transcribed and made available to the public throughout the school and community.
- --Elaine Anderson of Alpha Tau Chapter received the third grant of \$826.30 for her project entitled "Interactive Read Alouds In the Primary Grades." She will purchase a variety of books so as to form a foundation of literacy communities to provide students with the tools to discuss literature in a meaningful and collaborative way. This will service approximately 120 primary students in her school.

Our 20-in-20 Challenge is in full swing now that the year 2020 is here. Building Relationships with Persistence and Pride

A Guide to Enhance Chapter Membership

Education is a social enterprise and it involves communication, collaboration, and cooperation. Yet, in its very design, classrooms create silos where teachers are isolated from their peers and time is the enemy. Novel and veteran teachers alike seek out companionship that enables them to express their concern about students, changes in curriculum, and their own educational pathway when career opportunities arise.

DKG provides an avenue for educators to gather in a supportive and engaging manner that is simultaneously social and educational. When new members join the chapter it becomes invigorated, revitalized, and joyful!

Chapter presidents and current members need to connect with educators who are passionate about the profession and over time, build a relationship that amplifies support and concern. Look at local colleges, neighboring districts, and siblings of members that may also be educators. If you are no longer employed in an educational community, ask principals for the names of outstanding educators in their building. It is often with a great deal of pride that they will give you a few names as it enhances the school's reputation of having highly effective teachers. Once you contact a potential candidate emphasize that they would be an asset to the chapter. Just plant the seed. Upon the next meeting or correspondence discuss the regional, state, and international components of DKG. Always be cordial and explain the advantages of the organization, such as: networking, grants, scholarships, the UN connection, and the United States Forum. Younger teachers enjoy being involved in a cause or, at the very least, be given the opportunity to make a difference.

It would be appropriate at this time to ask for an email address to send them an overview of DKG. If you have an upcoming event invite them as the chapter's guest and introduce them to members that have similar interests. If they are reticent about coming alone, ask if they would like to bring a colleague. At each connection point always state that there is no pressure to join and reinforce that the chapter would be delighted to have them as a member. The process of accepting a new member may take one meeting or a course of communication over a few months. Always be mindful that teachers are very busy with work, family, and personal events. Stress that the benefits outweigh the minimal obligation and there will be an ebb and flow to that obligation over time. The president or chapter member needs to be persistent and constantly connect with the potential candidate in a supportive and friendly manner. The pride of being asked to participate in an international organization takes the teacher out of the classroom and into the global educational community.

CTAUN 2020



Several NYSO members were among the 673 attendees at the 75th CTAUN session at the United Nations, Manhattan, NY, on February 28, 2020. Past NYSO State President Anne-Marie Carlson chaired the event with aplomb in the beautiful Trusteeship Council Room. She and her Committee arranged prime reserved seating for International guests President Cathy Daughtry, Executive Director Nita Scott, Membership Director Trish Woodley, NYSO President Sue Kenoyer and Past State Presidents Dr. Andréa Morris, Karen Crumley and Joan Slagle.

Other NYSO members present were Sharon Patrick, Diane Davison, Arlene Ida and Sheila Brady Root, Barbara Keis, Ginny Dudko, Liz Huggler, Ellyn Levy, Fran Seymour, Pat Odessa, and Mary Ann Baldari. Members of NYSO and the CTAUN Committee who were there include Grace Murphy, Joan Goldstein, Lochie Musso, Eileen Venezia, former NGO Chair Dr. Rita King. These educators, and numerous others, smoothly facilitated the security process.

The topic this year was *War No More* and featured several panel discussions, individual speakers, and video clips. It did not pretend to have easy solutions to the ongoing wars. Rather, it emphasized the need for global discourse, the role women can play in deflecting conflict, and how women can be key players during war. Women can help others to survive, bring about peace, and end the normalization of war. One speaker had us consider the idea that ending war isn't just the cessation of bombs and fighting, but a change in the structure of thought and a process to imagine and construct a world where constructive change occurs for the better. That process needs to include women at the basic roots, along with men, to effect change. The effect of violence and chaos on children was another situation that women must face. A thought-provoking quote was that, "We write our life story by the choices we make." The quote is an incentive to be involved at a personal level.

CTAUN is an annual event that is publicized in The DKG International News, *Pi Lights*, and the CTAUN website (with a link on dkg.org). The Committee and Chair Anne-Marie Carlson motivated us to attend in spring 2021 when another topic will be highlighted.

She was beatified in 2005 and canonized in 2012.

Our chapter is proud of its long history of service projects that have benefited a wide variety of community organizations and constituents. 

Teaching Life Skills for Global Citizenship in Uganda

Gertrude Noden, *Beta Delta Chapter*, recently brought her Words Into Deeds professional development exercises to the UNIFAT Elementary School in Gulu, Uganda. Gertrude's connections with the school stem from many years during which her students raised a total of \$12,000 to support educational opportunities in Eastern Africa. A frequent guest to her classroom was Denis Okema, a Ugandan who had been abducted to be a child soldier at age 10. He later escaped to Gulu and was adopted by Abitimo Odongkara, founder of a school for children who, like



Denis, were orphaned by the ongoing terrible conflicts. The UNIFAT School became a beacon of hope for thousands of children and continues to serve the families of nearly 900 Gulu children.

At the invitation of an NPO called *Friends of UNIFAT*, Gertrude was asked to present workshops for UNIFAT teachers and administrators that would bring both curricular elements and pedagogical best practices strategies. The workshops were attended by thirty teachers plus staff and several students.





Participants first studied the *Universal Declaration of Human Rights* and their own *Uganda Constitution*, comparing the two and relating these to their curricular goals for each grade. The same was done for the *UN 2030 Sustainable Development Goals*, focusing on *Goal #3: Good Health and Well-Being*. During the second day of workshops, participants were tasked with designing grade-appropriate outreach projects for their students, including links to the *UDHR* and *SDGs*, goals and timelines, resources needed, and obstacles that would need to be overcome. In addition. Gertrude brought several cases of school supplies and 50 kits donated by the Ithaca *Days for Girls* group.





Three themes emerged from participants' post-workshop evaluations: limited financial support for students' outreach projects, lack of computers for access to electronic resources, and the desire to have additional professional development workshops. To address these, a large room is being renovated and equipped as a central computer center and an IT specialist was hired to provide on-site training for teachers and students. A small grants program has been launched that will provide teachers with funding for their proposed student outreach projects. The new facility will provide videoconferencing that will allow Gertrude and the teachers to work together in preparing these grants and bringing the strategies introduced at the workshops into their classrooms. These initiatives are being supported by *Words Into Deeds* and *Friends of UNIFAT*.
